

What Lies Beneath

Since buying their home in 2020, the Dodge family has been renovating the interior–from full kitchen and bathroom guts, to a mudroom and the addition of a wine cellar. After three years of countless projects, they felt it was time to tackle the outside of the house, with a focus on restoring the original beauty of the home.

"There had been vinyl siding on the house for 50 years, which was a positive in that it had been 'protecting' the original 1917 lap siding from the elements. It was also a risky project, because we weren't certain what the state of the original siding was."

If the siding had been damaged beyond repair, they ran the risk of having to tear it all off and put up all new siding. Luckily, once the vinyl was removed, only 5% of the boards needed to be replaced. After a couple weeks of patching and priming, their beautiful home boasted a fresh off-white color with creamy yellow undertones.

Caring for City Trees


Our beautiful neighborhood is the beneficiary of a variety of mature trees in the city-owned easements, which is the ground between the sidewalk and the curb.

Who owns these trees in the easement can be confusing, especially since we do most of the raking and watering as homeowners. Please remember that while you care for the trees in front of your house, the easement trees are not the homeowner's property.

These trees are the responsibility of the Forestry & Conservation program, a part of the Kansas City Parks & Recreation Department. You can learn more about the program by visiting this page: kcparks.org/forestry-conservation

If you believe a tree in your easement is diseased or dying, or if it presents a risk in the event of a storm, you should report the issue through the City's 311 action line, either via phone or online. Once a case has been assigned to your issue, the Kansas City forester will inspect the tree to determine if it should be removed or pruned, which will be done at city expense. If needed the city will replace the tree at their own expense. If a neighbor does not want to wait for the city to remove a tree (and then grind the stump), one may get a permit from the city, but the removal will be at homeowner's cost.

Speaking of the new trees, while the city is responsible for them it is definitely to your benefit—and to the neighborhood's—to help keep new trees watered the first couple of years as they are getting established to reduce the risk that they will die and have to be replaced.

TAPPING INTO CITY RESOURCES

With over a hundred of your signatures and work from passionate board members, CCDHA made a water-tight case to the city's Public Improvements Advisory Committee (PIAC) last Fall.

A NEIGHBORHOOD CENTERPIECE

Nestled in the middle of Country Club District, Schmelzer fountain at Rooster Island greets hundreds of walkers, runners, bikers and drivers each day. It's a pedestrian and cycling superhighway to and from Loose Park. Rooster Island is included on the route for several premiere road races which attract thousands of runners and spectators throughout the year. Many people benefit from this neighborhood gem.

BACKGROUND

In 2020 CCDHA invested \$8,600 for a new fountain which was funded solely by neighbor contributions. The association covered the expense of engineering, installation, landscape and hardscape. In installing the fountain the board made sure the plan aligned with city requirements to eventually tap into the existing water supply. Over the years the fountain has flowed due to the goodwill, time and money from neighbors. The PIAC grant program was the ideal opportunity for the city to partner with our neighborhood to provide a permanent water supply to the island.


TIRELESS EFFORTS

Country Club District board member, Jim Wilkinson, attributes the successful grant plea to community effort, "The main reason we got the grant was because it affected a great number of people and the signatures collected demonstrated how much people appreciate the fountain and what it does for the neighborhood."



The in-person presentation to the PIAC Committee was further supported with a slide presentation prepared by board member Keely Daly, who also spearheaded the signature collection drive.

GRANT AWARDED

This spring CCDHA received news that the city will fund the construction project that will tap into the city water line and extend it under Belleview Avenue to Rooster Island. They have not yet received notification of the start date.
