

Private Neighborhood Security Approved

Prompted by resident feedback on crime in the neighborhood, the CCDHA Board distributed a digital survey last Fall to gain a better understanding of issues facing our neighbors. The board then hosted a Town Hall Meeting on October 28 at Country Club Christian Church to discuss concerns and potential



solutions. At the meeting we heard from KCPD Community Interaction Officers, presented data on property crime trends in the surrounding area, shared best practices [see inset], learned how neighboring associations are addressing the issue, and listened to residents.

Following the Town Hall, the CCDHA Board reviewed several proposals for private security and ultimately settled on Metro Public Safety (MPS) as the best option to present to the neighborhood. MPS was the top choice based on their range of services, cost competitiveness, and recommendations from neighboring homes associations.

In mid-November neighbors received an email from the CCDHA presenting the proposal and ballot for expanding the association's services to include private neighborhood security. This proposal outlined the increased assessment cost. Voting closed on December 6 to a great response from our neighbors. With 133 households voting, the measure was approved by an 86% majority.

With the measure's approval, the board will begin contracting with MPS for private security services with an anticipated start date in early February. Residents will see the increase on their next assessment. The board plans to evaluate the partnership and value of services next Fall.

KEEP YOUR PROPERTY & LOVED ONES SAFE

Crime prevention tips from KCPD:

- Don't leave guns and cash in cars
- · Don't leave keys in idling cars
- Keep cars in the garage when possible
- Light outdoor areas
- Know your neighbors and communicate with them, especially when you are leaving town
- Get a FREE steering wheel lock at any KCPD station

If you experience crime:

- NEVER confront criminals because they are often armed.
 Property is not worth risking injury or death.
- · Ask neighbors if they have camera footage of incident
- Safely take note of detailed descriptions such as tattoos, a limp, etc.
- Report ALL crimes. Call the non-emergency number at 816-234-5111 to report minor crimes or report via the myKCMO app or at kcmo.gov. Call 911 for emergencies.

METRO PUBLIC SAFETY (MPS)

- "Class A" security firm with delegated police powers.
- Provides professionally trained and uniformed officers in marked patrol vehicles to conduct random patrols within the CCDHA boundaries 3 times a day/night, 7 days a week.
- Patrolling officer will do so in a manner to be most visible to deter, delay, detect and respond to any criminal activity.
- All officers hold security licenses with KCPD and are subject to ongoing FBI background checks.
- MPS carries general liability, umbrella, worker's compensation, and auto insurance coverages.
- MPS's main service is to keep an eye on the neighborhood, be visible, and look for cars or individuals who are casing houses or trespassing and question those individuals.
- In addition to patrols, residents will be able to call MPS's 24/7 dispatch to report anything from noise complaints to emergencies in process.


