

Against more than 28,000 zip codes, we came in at #10. Pretty impressive!

nationwide. In 2014, KC's average sales price of new and existing homes increased 5.2% compared to 2013 while the number of days it took to sell those homes dropped 3.6%. The chart above gives you an idea of how we fared last year in zip code 64113.

Won't You Be My Neighbor?

- 11. Exchange cell phone numbers with your neighbors. You don't have to be best buds but it is nice to have a number for emergencies.
- 12. And most importantly, talk to your neighbor when there is an issue. The entire block shouldn't know about it, but your neighbor should. Keep it non-confrontational and give them an opportunity to apologize or explain.
