Keep a current picture of your pet easily accessible to create fliers with MISSING in big bold letters on top and post in area businesses, and local veterinary offices. Visit the KCMO Animal Control. That building is huge and a dog you describe as an Australian Cattle Dog mix might be listed as a Shepherd mix and could be missed. Contact Lost Dog Registry with your name, pets name and description, and approx time and location last seen. They are located at 222 W Gregory Blvd, # 207 (in the Union Bank building) 816.333.0020.
