Security in Westwood Park

Did you know that Westwood Park has a Block Rep program? Every single block is covered by a volunteer who passes on information about security and any incidents in our neighborhood. In order to do this effectively, it's helpful to have the email or phone number of everyone on the block. Please notify your block rep if you have not been receiving email alerts from them. The Block Rep list is on page 3.

Several instances of theft have been reported this summer, including the theft of four tires from a car parked in a driveway and the theft of a catalytic converter from a car. A neighbor also reported that someone came up on her porch in broad daylight while she was sleeping and took her cell phone.

Want to Find Out the History of Your House? By Matt Nugent

Have you ever wondered who lived in your house before you? Perhaps you found some old tools in the basement, or there was something tucked away in the attic that piqued your interest, or perhaps you happen to love architecture and history and would be wondering about this stuff anyway. Fortunately, there are several local resources to help you in your quest.

If you do nothing else, get a copy of your house's tax photo. In 1940, Kansas City decided to photograph every building in the city for assessment purposes. In the process they created a time capsule of the city. After the city inexplicably tossed them in the trash some years later, most were rescued and now reside at the Kansas City Landmarks Commission, (816-513-2902, <u>landmarkcommission@kcmo.org</u>). You'll have to call and make an appointment to get a copy of your photo and it's best to go do it in person, because for some reason the photos aren't sorted by address. It requires a little sleuthing (the people from Landmarks are happy to help you with this), but it is well worth it. Cost: \$5. MVR is an amazing repository of local history where you will find the Criss-Cross City Directories for Kansas City, so named because they are sorted by address instead of last name. Kansas Citians of the early 20th century must have been a trusting lot, because in these directories you can find not only the

While you're at Landmarks, have them look up the original building permit for the house. This may appeal mostly to the architecturally-inclined, but it will tell you the day the permit was issued. It's your house's birthday, so to speak. It's only about the size of a 3x5 note card and contains basic details of the house: size, number of stories, and building material.

Across downtown from Landmarks at the Central Library is the Missouri Valley Room. The

MVR is an amazing repository tories for Kansas City, so named because they are sorted by address instead of last name. Kansas Citians of the early 20th century must have been a trusting lot, because in these directories you can find not only the name of the person living at your house but also their occupation and place of employment, whether they owned or rented the house, and if they had a telephone. The later directories contain less information, but they make it easy to create a list of the names and dates of everyone who has lived in your house.

With an inquisitive mind and just a little effort, you can find out what and who went before you. So

Problem Property?

Homes and yards that are not maintained properly quickly become eyesores and create an opportunity for crime, not to mention bringing down property values. Problems could include overgrown lawns, peeling paint, roof problems, hoarding, and not obtaining permits for home construction.

To report a problem property, call the action 3-1-1 line or visit the Kansas City, Missouri website for online reporting instructions. Kansas City has recently toughened the fines on violators, and a housing court is set up for the sole purpose of hearing these cases. Mow Your Leaves. As the leaves begin to fall, you can mow them in place in shallow batches. This provides a return to the soil of the nutrients the trees took up to make those leaves. Chopped leaves decompose quickly and lessen the need for fertilizer on lawns, flower beds, and gardens.

Unchopped leaves tend to linger a long time and act like roofing shingles so rain has trouble penetrating to the soil below. So save raking time, save fertilizer costs, and enrich your soil by taking this on a few leaves at a time.
