Living with A Walnut Tree

When we moved into our home in May of 2008 we were attracted by the beautiful old walnut trees – one in the front yard and one in the back yard. That was before we knew about life with a walnut tree. They are messy – with pollen, branches falling off the tree, a haven for scale, and then the walnuts fall! I was able to bribe the neighborhood children to pick up the walnuts until they discovered it wasn't as much fun as an Easter Egg hunt.

About four years ago the walnut tree started providing another kind of experience. Several times as I was making my morning trip to get the newspaper, I noticed my glass door was streaked and sticky, and there was a line of honey bees lying dead at the door. I finally realized that honey bees were residing in the walnut tree. I called in tree experts.

One of the possibilities was to remove the walnut tree. Now, the tree was very old, and it just did not seem fair to remove the tree, even though I had wished it gone many times. However, this past

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summer, the tree kept leaning more towards the house and kept losing branches due to gusts of wind. I decided the time had come for drastic action, so I looked into having the tree removed. But now the honey bees were an issue. Since our bee population has been diminishing, I did not want to disturb the bees. Again I called in experts to get their opinion. One said they could exterminate the bees and then it would be safe to take down the walnut tree. However, when I called Arbole's Tree Trimming, they would not hear of exterminating the bees and were confident that they could take down the tree and save the bees. That sounded good to me!

The tree experts arrived one morning armed with paper towels, duct tape, and a lot of muscle to begin their work. They stuffed the paper towels in the opening that the bees were using to get into the tree and secured the paper towels with duct tape. After cutting off most of the branches and estimating just how big and where the hive was, they sawed off that portion of the tree and slowly lowered it to the ground. To keep the bees from escaping, they placed heavy black bags over the ends and secured them with tape. It worked. Only one bee managed to sting a member of the crew.

The team then hoisted the huge log full of bees onto their truck. A meeting with a bee keeper had already been arranged, and a transfer of the log full of bees was made to another truck, which took the bees to their new home in Lone Jack. The last word I heard was that the bees had settled into their new home and were busy pollinating the plants in their new neighborhood.

The bees are happy, I am happy, and I'm having the time of my life creating a totally new garden in my front yard. >>
